ABOUT HUMANITY FIRST

Humanity First is a non-political, non-religious and impartial international relief and development agency that focuses on protecting human life and dignity. It provides aid on the basis of necessity alone, irrespective of caste, creed, color or religion. It serves socially disadvantaged individuals and families in the poorer communities and disaster struck areas of the world.

Humanity First has consultative status with United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). It began its operations in the early 1990 and was formally established under a trust deed as a registered charity with the UK Charities Commission, in November 1995. The organization is now registered in 62 countries, across 6 continents, in the world. HF provides aid and resources to millions of people in need. Its initial mission was to focus on disaster response programs across Europe. After some time, its operations metamorphosed into alleviating poverty, improving standards of living, refining health resources and services, and promoting quality education to vulnerable communities.

In Nigeria, Humanity First Nigeria (HFN) is a registered organization with the Nigerian government, the Corporate Affairs Commission (CAC). HFN is working tenaciously to also carry out activities of Humanity First International in Nigeria as is done in other parts of the World. In recent time, some of the activities of HFN include:

1. INTRODUCTION

This report aims at itemizing the major activities of the Disaster Relief and Programs (DRPT) Team of Humanity first Nigeria in year 2023. In this report, we have also tried to compare the activities done by the team in 2022 and 2023; with a view to make realistic plan for 2024.

It is important to note that year 2023 was a very challenging time for HFN Disaster Relief team; mainly due to inadequate of resources to carry out efficiently our tasks. Despite the obvious challenges the DPRT encountered, we tried so hard to consolidate our efforts in ensuring we did everything within available resources.

2. DRPT's ACHIEVEMENTS

2.1 HUMANITY FIRST DISASTER RELIEF AND PROGRAMS TEAM (HFN DRPT)

ABOUT HFN DRPT: Humanity first disaster and programs team was inaugurated in 2022 with a mandate to ensure readiness to intervene when any disaster occurs in Nigeria and also have the capacity to provide succour to all who may be affected in the case of disaster.

In order to ensure that this mandate is effectively done HFN DRPT has in partnership with our development partners established the HFN Clothes Bank to assist in disaster relief preparedness and also facilitate support for the less privileged

This is a summary of HFN DRPT's main activities for 2023

2.2 ACHIEVEMENTS OF HUMANITY FIRST DISASTER RELIEF AND PROGRAMS TEAM

2.2.1 CLOTHES BANK

- i. Collect a total of 4,238 clothes from donors at 3 dedicated collection programs. We also received constant collections in other 5 collection points. In total, we had over 739 donors.
- ii. HFN Clothes Bank conducted over 30 dedicated laundry and sorting activities in Oyo, Ogun and Kwara states. Lagos,



- Ogun, Rivers and Abuja continuously had laundry and sorting activities for clothes and other items collected. Over 4000 items were laundered during the year under review.
- iii. HFN Clothes Bank team conducted distribution activities in five states of the Federation.
- iv. Over 9000 clothes and other items were distributed with over 7000 beneficiaries in over6 states of Nigeria.
- v. Engage 400 volunteers who dedicated over 13,000 manhours worth of service to collect, launder and distribute clothes in over 6 states and 30 local Governments areas. spread across the states of Nigeria.
- vi. Receive 2 manual washing machines as donations, over 100,000-naira cash donations and other donations such detergents and other laundry consumables.
- vii. Raise and utilize over seven hundred thousand naira; mainly among team members to carry out all our activities.1. Humanity First Nigeria Clothes Bank sent Clothes to Burkina Faso to support Internally Displaced Persons
- viii. The HFN Disaster Relief team lead Abdul-Qadir Abdul-Rafi was appointed as a member of the Executive Committee of the Humanity First International Disaster Relief team representing West Africa
- ix. Humanity First Nigeria Clothes Bank with support from Humanity First USA sent Clothes to Burkina Faso to support Internally Displaced Persons

2.2.2 DISASTER RELIEF

- I. NEEDS ASSESSMENT: Conduct 3 needs assessment activities in flood disaster affected areas.
- ii. VOCATIONAL TRAINING: HFN DRPT in its desire to give lasting relief to disaster victims in July conducted Vocational training 80flood disaster victims in 6 vocations in Port



Harcourt Rivers state.

2.3 **ONGOING PROJECTS**

- 1. HFN CLOTHES BANK LAGOS CENTRE: The Lagos Centre clothes bank building is 10% Complete. We presently use the Lajnah Imaillah house for the activities of the centre.
- 2. TRAINING OF FLOOD DISASTER VICTIMS: The DRPT has conducted the second Phase of its intervention to support victims of flood in Nigeria by conducting a training for flood disaster victims in Port-Harcourt, Rivers State. The project trained 80 disaster victims in 6 different skills. Plans are also on to train more victims in additional vocations
- 3. PROVISION OF CLOTHES TO STUDENTS: Call for donation has been made for the program funds for the program not yet achieved
- **CHALLENGES:** The DRPT's huge obligations are faced with the following challenges:
 - (a) Inadequate funds
 - (b) Lack of mobility
 - (c) Inadequate manpower
 - (d) Lack of other resources(laptop, digital camera, mobile tent etc.)

3.0 MEDIA AND PUBLICITY

HFN DRPT promotes her activities through the following:

- **SOCIAL MEDIA:** DRPT posts on HFN's @humanityfirstng (i) Facebook page have garnered over 1000 likes and shares, reaching about 25,000 people.
- HFN DPRT activities were covered by news reports of (ii) Nigerian Television Authority (NTA) at Port Harcourt station, The Truth Newspapers, MTA International and Jalsa Salana Nigeria 2023.



4.0 ONGOING PROJECTS

- (I) HFN CLOTHES BANK LAGOS CENTRE: The Lagos Center clothes bank building is 10% complete. We presently use the Lajnah Imaillah house for the activities of the centre. (ii) TRAINING OF IDPs: As noted in section 2.2 (item 2), the DRPT has conducted the second phase of its intervention to support victims of flood in Nigeria, through a training which was conducted in Port-Harcourt, Rivers State. The project trained 8 disaster victims in 6 different skills.
- (iii) PROVISION OF CLOTHES TO STUDENTS: Call for donation has been made for the program with the approval of the Respected Chairman HFN BOT we are yet to raise substantial funds to carry out the project

5.0 OUR CHALLENGES

The DRPT's huge obligations are faced with the following challenges:

- (a) Inadequate funds
- (b) Lack of mobility
- (c) Inadequate manpower
- (d) Lack of other resources (laptop, digital camera, mobile tent etc.)

6.0 FINANCE:

INCOME -- N781,000 EXPENSES -- N781, 800

6.1 Points Note:

 No fund was received from our development partners for the purposes of Clothes bank activities, 80% of the funds were received from HFN. The remaining 20% of the funds reported above were mostly raised from team members (volunteers).



2. Other administrative expenses have not been captured in the reports.

7.0 REVIEW OF 2022 and 2023 ACTIVITIES

7.1 CLOTHES BANK:

- (i) COLLECTION OF CLOTHES: There was a deliberate effort to restrict the number of clothes collected in our Lagos centre (the largest clothes collection and distribution centre). We also reduced the outings in Oyo state and other states with no facilities for laundry, due to the fact that we did not presently have adequate resources to store and launder. However, in year 2022, we received over 15,000 items from 762 donors in 25 collection activities while in year 2023 we collected just over 3000 items, donated by 739 people in 25 activities.

 Over 250,000.00 naira was spent on those activities.
- (ii) LUNDRY OF CLOTHES: In year 2023, our centres in Lagos, Rivers and Abuja were able to utilize acquired washing machine (Abuja and Rivers have front loading washing machine acquired by HFN while Lagos has a top loading washing machine donated by Lajnah Imaillah Nigeria). Oyo state carried out manual washing of clothes in 3 points while other states only sorted items collected. In summary the department carried out 15 laundry activities in 4 centres. We spent over 500,500.00 naira only.
- (iii) **DISTRIBUTION OF CLOTHES:** In year 2023, we distributed over 10,000 items to over 3000 people in 13 distribution activities while in 2022 the department donated over 5000 items to over 2500 people who were needy. In 10 distribution activities, over 364,000 naira was expended in carrying out those activities.



7.2 **DISATER RELIEF ACTIVITIES:**

- (i) **NEEDS ASSESSMENT:** In year 2023, we received over 25 distress calls based on flood disasters. We were able to carry out 3 needs assessment activities. In year 2022, we received over 20 distress calls and we were able to carry out 5 needs assessment of flood devastated areas.
- **DISASTER RELIEF EFFORTS:** In year 2023, we were unable (ii) to carry out any disaster relief efforts while in 2022 the department carried out disaster relief efforts in 5 communities.
- OTHER EFFORTS: In year 2023, the department received (iii) funding for the training of flood disaster victims. The First phase has been carried out effectively. We await plans for the second phase to be finalized.

7.3 **GENERAL COMMENTS:**

The department was not able to effectively carry out its plans for year 2023; despite the fact that 2023 was our first full year of operation. The challenge was due to lack of funding.

DRPT's PROJECTED ACTIVITIES FOR THE YEAR 2024: By 8.0 God's grace and the teams' support, the DRPT aspires

- To increase clothes collected and refurbished by 100%.
- 2. Improve HFN's response to disaster.
- 3. Assist in mitigating factors that can lead to disaster by providing to support to the vulnerable in the society.
- Provide support to victims of spinal cord injuries in Lagos.

These are our broad objectives for 2024 which we hope to achieve by carrying out the following activities:








Figure 3: Total Number of Clothes Collected Per State Per Month in Year 2023




Figure 4: Total Number of Clothes Distributed Per State Per Month in Year 2023




Figure 5: Comparative Analysis of Year 2022 and 2023 in term of Collections Per Month




Figure 6: Comparative Analysis of Year 2022 and 2023 in term of Distributions Per Month




Figure 7: Total Amount of Man-Hours Workdone per Month, in term of Collections, for Year 2023




Figure 8: Total Amount of Man-Hours Workdone per Month, in term of Distributions, for Year 2023





Figure 9: Total Number of Volunteers per Month per State, in term of Collections, in Year 2023

Humanity First Nigeria, through its "Knowledge for Life" initiative, focuses on providing educational and community support in remote areas of Oyo State. Currently, the organization oversees two schools located in Igbo Oruwo, Ookoko, and Iye Osa, both situated in Ido Local Government, Ibadan.

The total student population across both schools is 91, with 41 Students in Iye Osa and 50 Students in Igbo Oruwo, Ookoko.

Educational Progress:

The facilitators in both schools have undergone training and are actively engaged in imparting knowledge to the pupils. However, there is a recognized need for additional personnel to further enhance the quality of education provided.

Infrastructure:

The existing infrastructure, including furniture and other facilities, is in place, contributing to a conducive learning environment. However, there is a requirement for boreholes to ensure a sustainable supply of portable water. Additionally, the provision of sporting materials is essential to promote physical activity and recreational opportunities among the students.

Distribution of New Uniforms:

Attached to this report is a picture report on the successful distribution of new uniforms to pupils in Lye Osa, Ido Local Government, Ibadan, Oyo State. The event witnessed the presence of the circuit President, executive members, the Head Chief of the community, and participating parents. This initiative aims to instill a sense of pride and equality among the students.





Visit to Igbo Oruwo, Ookoko:

Another attached report documents a visit to Igbo Oruwo, Ookoko, Oyo State. The team, consisting of the HF secretary, Alhaji Raji Daod, the Knowledge for Life team lead, and the Jama'at chief driver, visited the school. The visit included an interaction with Mr. Mukaila, one of the teachers, providing valuable insights into the on-ground situation.





Summary:

In 2023, HFN's Orphan Care Program continues to make a significant impact by sponsoring 23 orphan children, with a distribution of twelve males and eleven females.

Since its inception, the program has sponsored over 29 children, allocating funds for upkeep and educational allowances from basic to tertiary education, totaling over 3.4 million naira and 1.3 million naira, respectively.


